# FILM TRILOGY

We have a special treat for you in our upcoming programs. Over the year, we will show three films about life in the former East Germany from three different perspectives.

One is an East German movie, *Der Untertan* (The Kaiser's Lackey); the second one, *Als die Mauer fiel - 50 Stunden, die die Welt veränderten* (When the Wall Came Tumbling Down - 50 Hours that Changed the World) is from the transition period after the wall fell; and the third one, *Good bye, Lenin,* is from an East German perspective after unification.

Der Untertan, first in the trilogy, has been called "A historical satire of biting sharpness and grand comedy. Staudte's wonderfully successful adaptation of Heinrich Mann's world-famous novel has become a film classic."

Dr. Sandy Frieden from the University of Houston, who is an expert on East German film, will make introductory remarks.

# Kudos for the University of Leipzig

After a tough competition among universities, The Fulbright Commission, Berlin, established a Distinguished American Studies Chair especially for the University of Leipzig. Congratulations to Professor Anne Koenen and Professor Hartmut Keil (who visited Houston with his students last year) of the Institute of American Studies at the university. Prof. Crister Garrett of the University of Wisconsin is the first holder of the chair, and held his inaugural lecture on the topic "Toward a New Culture of Communication: Constructing Transatlantic Relations for the Twenty-First Century." Prof. Garrett's research includes behavior in multi-ethnic societies. He will stay for two semesters at the University of Leipzig.

The German Research Foundation awarded the first international post-graduate/Ph.D. studies program in the field of interface physics for research on diffusion in porous materials to the University of Leipzig.
